In the dance studio and on the stage, our talented performers have dedicated countless hours to perfecting their craft. They have shared their dreams, pushed their limits, and created moments of pure magic.

Years 9 and 10 Dance students focused on developing their technique and appreciation for Musical Theatre, First Nations, and World Dance. Throughout both semesters students have been exploring how to compose using the elements of dance and creatively apply choreographic devices. Students demonstrated through their Performing Arts Process Diaries their knowledge and understanding of these styles, exploring musicals, pioneers, and companies. From Chicago to Hamilton, Bangarra Dance Company to Bollywood. This is key for students to develop their capacity to appreciate the Arts through the written form. A highlight for our students was their World Dance Composition Task. Their choreography took us on an exhilarating journey across continents and cultures, where students transcended boundaries through the universal language of dance. As diverse as our student body, the compositions were a true celebration of global unity and artistic expression.

The Year 11 and 12 Senior students completed units that focused on context and collaboration in Dance. In Semester 1, the Dance in the context unit served as a dynamic and engaging means of exploring the rich tapestry of human culture and history. Students composed solos routines that allowed them to reflect on their own context, creating a work based on self, place or time. The Semester 2 highlight was Dance Festival. This student-driven unit is an opportunity for students to showcase their knowledge of choreography, production elements and how to collaborate to ensure it all comes together as a polished end product. This was a challenging but rewarding experience for all, as the students honed their collaboration skills. The class developed the theme of 'Trance'. This work explored how society is in this state of 'Trance' where the boundaries of reality blur, intense focus merges with moments euphoria.

As we reflect on the past year in Dance, we are grateful for the boundless creativity that dance brings into our lives here at Merici. It is a testament to the student's artistry, dedication, and unity that defines our dance community.

### <u>Drama</u>

### "Theatre is a form of knowledge; it should and can also be a means of transforming society. Theatre can help us build our future, rather than just waiting for it". Augusto Boal

As Arts educators, one of the most gratifying aspects of our profession is witnessing students embark on a journey with a fundamental concept, whether it's a script, a theme, or an idea. We observe them tirelessly refine, sculpt, and sometimes even discard these concepts entirely to craft a polished performance. This creative process serves as an arena for our students to nurture their capacity to embrace risks, collaborate seamlessly within a team, overcome obstacles, and uncover hidden talents they may have never recognized within themselves.

In 2023, we welcomed a new cohort of aspiring artists, all eager to cultivate their artistic skills and express themselves through their craft. The year began with the Year 9/10 classes exploring four different types of comedy: slapstick, farce, satire, in their unit 'Comedy Chaos,' with a particular emphasis on Commedia dell'Arte. Developing their skills in these four comedy forms required them to hone three distinct abilities: improvisation, interpreting play scripts, and writing student play scripts. Meanwhile, the Senior Drama class experimented with Kabuki, Kathakali, Commedia dell'Arte, and Greek styles of theatre in their World Theatre unit.

Once again, both the Year 9/10 Drama classes and the Senior Drama classes participated in this year's ACTUp Festival. They explored the stimulus images provided by Canberra Theatre and, following numerous workshops and visits from industry professionals, successfully created original works. Each student seized the opportunity to perform on the Playhouse

Stage, entertaining not only their peers from other participating schools but also their families, friends, and a public audience. The performances from all three classes received exceptional acclaim and became crowd favourites.

In the second semester, the Year 9/10 class explored the genre of Horror. We delved into the darker aspects of human existence through Gothic Theatre, enabling students to gain insight into societal issues, challenge norms, and develop their creative and expressive abilities in the drama room. Additionally, students were introduced to Butoh, a form of Japanese dance theatre that emerged around 1969 after World War II. We also examined the work of Antonin Artaud, who had a profound impact on the Theatre of the Absurd and the conceptualization of the Theatre of Cruelty. In the realm of horror performance, the class skilfully employed the fundamental elements of Drama to evoke tension and suspense. Through meticulous use of plot development, character portrayal, setting, sound, and lighting, students created an immersive experience that captivated the audience and elicited visceral reactions, heightening the overall impact of our haunting production.

In the Senior's unit 'Adaptation in Drama,' students examined a range of spoken, performed, visual, and written texts to understand how universal themes and perspectives are represented through adaptation. They took classic children's stories and transformed them into Audiobooks for a visually impaired audience using a variety of methods, mediums, and techniques to achieve their transformation and adaptation. They finished the year by focusing on slam poetry, where they harnessed the power of slam poetry as a creative vehicle to delve into complex and thought-provoking topics. Through the rhythmic cadence and passionate delivery of their verses, they effectively tackled issues like identity, social justice, and personal struggles, sparking deep and meaningful discussions within the group. Slam poetry has become a dynamic tool for self-expression and empathy-building, fostering a vibrant and inclusive learning environment in the drama class.

As we bid farewell to our current Year 12 Drama students, and our current Year 11s step into their shoes, I extend my heartfelt best wishes to all of them as they embark on their remarkable journey in the world of performing arts. I eagerly anticipate witnessing where their journey, love, and passion will take them on a global stage.

### Music and Co-curricular Music

From fostering cognitive development to enhancing emotional intelligence and promoting creativity, the importance of music in education cannot be overstated when considering the transformative power of music and its enduring relevance in shaping well-rounded individuals.

2023 has been an enriching year for Music at Merici due to the implementation of the new Merici instrumental program, music enrichment opportunities and growth of co-curricular music ensembles.

The Merici College instrumental music program has seen an influx of students eager to learn various instruments including piano, violin, cello, flute, clarinet, saxophone, french horn, trumpet, guitar, bass guitar, drum kit and voice through weekly private tuition. The dedication of the eleven music tutors, who provide personalised guidance to each student, has made this program a resounding success. Personal milestones have been achieved by our Merici Music students in a variety of ways and this has also included obtaining impressive results in AMEB exams.

Enrichment opportunities have been influential in the growth of Year 9 and 10 MYP Music, Year 11 amd 12 BSSS Music and for the first time, Year 11 IB Music which commenced at Merici in 2023. Each program has allowed students of all levels of musical experience to find their place, growing not only as musicians but as a close-knit musical family. Year 9 and 10 students have remarked that one of the highlights of their year was taking part in a Balinese Gamelan Music workshop at the Indonesian Embassy, whilst Year 10–12 Music students enjoyed the wonders of the musical 'Beauty and the Beast' at the Capitol Theatre in Sydney.

Beyond the classroom, Co-curricular Music has not only grown in student numbers but also in the array of performance opportunities. The Merici Vocal Group, Concert Band and String Ensemble have flourished through performance opportunities including the CAPA Showcase, Merici Masses, Anzac Day Assembly, Open Day and Floriade on Stage 88, in addition to many vocalists taking part in the College Musical, 'Alice in Wonderland'. Cocurricular Music students also enjoyed attending a preconcert talk delivered by Canberra Symphony Orchestra (CSO) staff, followed by a performance of 'Electric Blue', a compositional program aiming to encompass and portray the ever-present blue of the skies above and the oceans below, with music by Rimsky-Korsakov and Alexander Scriabin and a new commission from Miriama Young performed by the CSO at Llewellyn Hall (ANU).

Our school's Music program has experienced a year of extraordinary growth and achievement. The Merici Vocal Group, Concert Band, String Ensemble and instrumental lessons have not only expanded in student numbers but have also created more performance opportunities than ever before. This program has united students through the universal language of music, empowering students to explore their musical passions, celebrate diversity, fostering a sense of community and artistic excellence whilst creating a lasting musical legacy at Merici College.
